SILENT SKY

When Henrietta Leavitt begins work at the Harvard Observatory in the early 1900s, she isn't allowed to touch a telescope or express an original idea. Instead, she joins a group of women "computers," charting the stars for a renowned astronomer who calculates projects in "girl hours" and has no time for the women's probing theories. As Henrietta, in her free time, attempts to measure the light and distance of stars, she must also take measure of her life on Earth, trying to balance her dedication to science with family obligations and the possibility of love. The true story of 19th-century astronomer Henrietta Leavitt explores a woman's place in society during a time of immense scientific discoveries, when women's ideas were dismissed until men claimed credit for them. Social progress, like scientific progress, can be hard to see when one is trapped among earthly complications; Henrietta Leavitt and her female peers believe in both, and their dedication changed the way we understand both the heavens and Earth.

PLAYWRIGHT BIO



Lauren has been one of the most produced playwrights in America since 2015, topping the list twice including 2019/20. She is a twotime winner of the Steinberg/ATCA New Play Award for I AND YOU and THE BOOK OF WILL, the winner of the Lanford Wilson Award and the Otis Guernsey New Voices Award, a finalist for the Susan Smith Blackburn Prize and John Gassner Award for Playwriting, and a recipient of the Mellon Foundation's Residency with Marin Theatre Company. She studied Southern Literature and Drama at Emory University, and Dramatic Writing at NYU's Tisch School where she was a Reynolds Fellow in Social Entrepreneurship. Her newest play THE CATASTROPHIST, about her husband virologist Nathan Wolfe, premiered digitally in January 2021. She co-authored the Miss Bennet plays with Margot Melcon, and her audioplay THE HALF-LIFE OF MARIE CURIE is available on Audible.com. Her work is published at Playscripts (I AND YOU, EXIT PURSUED BY A BEAR, THE TAMING, and TOIL AND TROUBLE), Dramatists Play Service (THE REVOLUTIONISTS, THE BOOK OF WILL, SILENT SKY, BAUER, NATURAL SHOCKS, THE WICKHAMS, and MISS BENNET) and Samuel French (EMILIE). Her picture book "Dr. Wonderful: Blast Off to the Moon" is available from Two Lions/Amazon. She is currently developing musicals with Ari Afsar, Dave Stewart and Joss Stone, and Kait Kerrigan and Bree Lowdermilk.

DRAMATURGY NOTE

What do you see when you look up to the sky?

The universe as it manifests itself in its collection of twinkling stars and misty galaxies? A heaven from where lost loved ones caringly watch over your life? A black hole of the unknown that disorients our fragile sense of knowledge of the microcosm? Or a reflection of your own observing self as you are seeking for the meaning of your existence?

In Lauren Gunderson's play *Silent Sky*, Henrietta Leavitt, Annie Cannon, and Williamina Fleming are three female astronomers at the beginning of the 20th century, who study the sky at the Harvard Observatory. As human "computers," the women identify and categorize the stars, making some of the most foundational discoveries of astronomy—discoveries that for a long time will be attributed to the male scientists who supervised and used their research. While their work receives little acknowledgement, Henrietta, Annie, and Williamina—all of whom are based on historical figures—tenaciously pursue their passion, devoting their lives to the exploration of the universe. And yet the play is asking again and again, is there, should there be "more to life than this?"

The historic tableau of *Silent Sky* shows the many sacrifices these brilliant women had to make: they gave up on romantic love, children, and material wealth. Still, they forged a sisterhood, a chosen family, in which they empowered each other—and many future generations of women—to recognize their own self-worth and advocate for their rights. Looking up to the sky, they were not merely seeing the pulsating, colorful stars and novae, but, some light years away in the future, an auspicious space of infinite possibilities and personal fulfillment.

he benevolence of Arnold and Janet Kinghorn Bernhard (Class of 1926) made Skidmore's theater facility a reality. The 34,000 square-foot Janet Kinghorn Bernhard Theater is one of four performing and fine arts facilities at Skidmore, along with the Arthur Zankel Music Center, the Saisselin Arts Building, and the Dance Center. It boasts a 345-seat thrust theater as well as a studio black box theater, in which a variety of seating and staging arrangements are explored. Both theater spaces use state-of-the-art theater equipment. The building also houses complete training and support facilities, including scenic, lighting, paint and costume shops, rehearsal and design studios, and faculty and staff offices. The Bernhard Theater has become a vital cultural resource for college and community life at Skidmore and serves as a home to the Skidmore Theater program, recognized nationwide for offering the finest pre-professional undergraduate theater training within the context of a strong liberal arts education.

Due in large part to the generosity of Jean Bernhard Buttner, the Janet Kinghorn Bernhard Theater has enjoyed some much welcomed improvements. These include a new media classroom, completely redesigned and refurbished design studio and technical offices, new carpeting, new exterior doors, a fresh paint job and new signage. All of these improvements serve our ever-growing enrollments in the theater.
