CONTENT DISCLOSURE

This play contains themes of violence in the forms of substance abuse, homophobia, and the use of a firearm.

Fire Arm

The play includes the use of a prop gun, which is a nonfunctional but realistic replica of a Colt 45 automatic handgun. The firearm is never discharged on stage.

Homophobia

There is homophobic graffiti painted on the door of Jonah's place of work. Brendan makes a comment about Jonah's sexuality which is an erasure of his gender identity.

Substance Abuse

Ben and Jonah both smoke cigarettes throughout the play. All the characters in this play interact with substance abuse in the form of alcohol. Jonah appears intoxicated multiple times in the play. Violence in this play never leads to physical contact.

PLAYWRIGHT BIO



Darcy Parker Bruce is a graduate of the MFA Playwriting program at Smith College. In the summer they join the Sewanee Writers' Conference as part of their staff. Darcy was the recipient of a 2017 Tennessee Williams Scholarship through the Sewanee Writers' Conference and was a 2019 LAMBDA Literary Fellow. In 2018 they were granted ATHE's Judith Royer Award For Excellence in Theater for their play Soldier Poet. They are currently working on several projects including a cycle of plays investigating the relationship between small towns, queers, and American Glory. This summer their play To The Moon And Back opens at Chester Theater Company. Their work can now be purchased through Broadway Play Publishing. This fall they join the Interlochen Center for the Arts as their 2022-23 Writer-in-Residence.

FROM THE DRAMATURG

Place is central to the story of this play. The geographic experiences of Ben, Jonah, Bud, Emily, and Brendan shape who they are, and how they deal with the conflicts they face. The rural Connecticut landscape made (and continues to make) these characters who they are. Through this play, we experience "two Conneticuts," a term that refers to the ever-growing gap between the poorest and richest communities and individuals who live in the state. As Connecticut's middle class disappears, socio-economic divisions in the state continue to widen, and the opportunities offered to these "two Connecticuts" are vastly different. The working-class, rural communities of Connecticut have become active spots for military recruitment post-9/11 because the young people there often lack access to other jobs and educational opportunities. This pushes them to accept the financial incentives and job security given by the Armed Forces. Although exact figures differ, researchers generally agree that young people from rural areas serve at higher rates than the percentage of the population they make up. These circumstances inform Ben's decision to join the Armed Forces, which leads to their involvement in the Syrian Civil War. Syria is another place that is central to The Place That Made You. The geography of the Syrian Civil War is complicated, as the conflict has been ongoing since 2011 between many different Syrian groups and foreign forces. Currently, six different armed groups, each with their own agendas, control significant sections of territory within Syria. Ben is deployed in Syria because the United States is one of the foreign actors involved in the war. The part of Ben's deployment explored in this play is in Aleppo, the second-largest city in Syria. The Battle of Aleppo was an ongoing fight for control of the city from 2012 until 2016. In the summer of 2016, Aleppo was divided between the Syrian Arab Republic and the Free Syria Army, which was backed by the United States. The battle reached its peak in July 2016 when both groups cut off the other's supply lines, and heavy bombing began. This place, too, makes the lives of this play. While the geography of Syria and the experiences of those living there differ from the material experiences of small-town Connecticut, these places are still linked through the circumstances of the characters in this play. As you watch this production, I encourage you to think about all the places that shape these characters and their stories, and why place is so essential to The Place That Made You.

The benevolence of Arnold and Janet Kinghorn Bernhard (Class of 1926) made Skidmore's theater facility a reality. The 34,000 square-foot Janet Kinghorn Bernhard Theater is one of four performing and fine arts facilities at Skidmore, along with the Arthur Zankel Music Center, the Saisselin Arts Building, and the Dance Center. It boasts a 345-seat thrust theater as well as a studio black box theater, in which a variety of seating and staging arrangements are explored. Both theater spaces use stateof-the-art theater equipment. The building also houses complete training and support facilities, including scenic, lighting, paint and costume shops, rehearsal and design studios, and faculty and staff offices. The Bernhard Theater has become a vital cultural resource for college and community life at Skidmore and serves as a home to the Skidmore Theater program, recognized nationwide for offering the finest pre-professional undergraduate theater training within the context of a strong liberal arts education.

Due in large part to the generosity of Jean Bernhard Buttner, the Janet Kinghorn Bernhard Theater has enjoyed some much welcomed improvements. These include a new media classroom, completely redesigned and refurbished design studio and technical offices, new carpeting, new exterior doors, a fresh paint job and new signage. All of these improvements serve our ever-growing enrollments in the theater.
